Introduction

Conference Aims

Health professionals everywhere need to meet the challenges of role change and new ways of working, in response to changing population demographics and health needs. The conference will explore shifting the balance of care, new roles and new models of care, with a keen focus on future proofing of health services.

The conference will bring together health professionals across a wide range of fields with a wealth of different backgrounds and experiences, providing an opportunity to showcase work and share best practice.

There will also be a celebration of International Nurses Day on 12 May. This international conference continues to build on shared experiences and shared learning between NHS Highland and the Northern Norway Regional Health Authority (Helse Nord).

Themes

“Future Proofing” is about being better equipped and trained to plan ahead for changing public health needs, developing anticipatory care models and building sustainable services. The conference will provide an opportunity to exchange ideas and plan for healthy communities, promoting good health, self care and preventing illness. Health professionals need to work together with partners in social care and the voluntary sector, as well as carers, to break down the barriers to better services. Workforce development, education and leadership are fundamental to the challenges of managing change. The conference will challenge delegates to welcome innovation and new ways of working, by exploring research and re-design opportunities.

- *To enable frontline practitioners to share and celebrate their own practice developments and experiences with new models of care in meeting the health needs of their communities*
- *To celebrate innovation and creativity by Health Professionals, looking into new models of service delivery across clinical and geographical boundaries and strategies for shifting the balance of care*

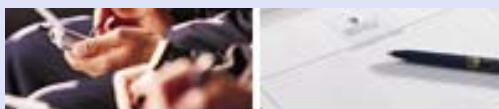

Short Biographies of Speakers

In order of programme

Mr Paul Martin RN, RHV, DMS, MBA Chief Nursing Officer and Interim Director for Health Workforce for Scotland



Paul Martin took up the post of Chief Nursing Officer for Scotland in September 2004. In this role he advises Ministers on all matters relating to nursing, midwifery, health visiting and the allied health professions. In March 2005, in addition to his role as Chief Nursing Officer, Paul took over the role of Interim Director for Health Workforce.

Until August 2004 Paul was Deputy Chief Executive (Modernisation), Highland Direct Health Services (formerly Chief Executive, Highland Primary Care NHS Trust), a post he took up in July 2002. Paul was previously Director of Nursing and Allied Health Professionals in Renfrewshire and Inverclyde Primary Care NHS Trust for 3½ years, and Director of Nursing and Community Services, NHS Borders for 4½ years.

Paul has a broad experience in nursing, having trained and practiced as a general nurse, a midwife and a health visitor. He has extensive general management experience across primary care and mental health services and holds a Diploma in Management Studies and a Masters in Business Administration. In December 2007 Paul was given the honorary award of Doctor of the University of the West of Scotland.

Dr Margit Steinholt, MD, Specialist in Obstetrics and Gynecology

Head of Obstetrics and Gynaecology in Sandnessjøen Hospital with responsibility for the midwife-led units in Mosjøen and Brønnøysund. She is newly appointed the Employee Director for Medical Staffing in Helse Nord.

Worked in Northern Norway for 20 years, promoting safe motherhood in this region. Since 2004 participating in teaching and training of midwives, doctors and traditional birth attendants in poor and rural areas of Cambodia. This work is done through the Trauma Care Foundation, Tromsø.

Margit is also an elected Employee Director of Medical and Academic staffing.



Dr. Jim White, Consultant Clinical Psychologist



Jim White is a consultant clinical psychologist and leader of the STEPS primary care mental health in Glasgow. He has worked for many years in primary care, developing stepped-care services for common mental health problems. Recently, he has developed a range of cognitive behavioural approaches for those people who want to learn better ways of dealing with depression and anxiety including large 'evening classes' (100+), a website, booklet series and DVDs. He has written extensively on mental health and has published in peer-reviewed journals and has written two books. He has

presented numerous workshops and papers at national and international conferences. He is a Fellow of the British Psychological Society.

Dr Andrew Lyon , International Futures Forum

After five years working in shops and factories, Andrew studied Sociology and Economics at Edinburgh University. After completing his PhD, he led a community oriented health programme at Polaroid UK Ltd, before moving to Glasgow to lead the Healthy Cities Programme. He has also worked for the WHO in Bangladesh and Europe. With Forward Scotland, he led on a Scottish approach to Sustainable Development from 1996- 2001. Now with the International Futures Forum, he leads on programmes designed to restore effectiveness in times of rapid change. Also a volunteer by nature, he currently serves on the

boards of several innovative charities. He loves to cycle, is a poor but enthusiastic astronomer. He also says he can play the flute and the uilleann pipes, his children say he can't! He thrives on the connection between thinking and doing.



Dr George Crooks, Interim Chief Executive and Medical Director NHS 24

Dr George Crooks has been a General Practitioner in Aberdeen for the past 22 years. He was previously the Director of Primary Care for NHS Grampian, with responsibility for the provision and development of community based health services and lead on the implementation of a managed clinical network for unscheduled care in Grampian. Since moving to NHS24 as Medical Director he has been involved in a clinical leadership role with the national unscheduled care collaborative supporting the development and redesign of health services with the aim of reducing A+E attendances, reducing hospital admissions and facilitating early successful discharge. His interests include whole system thinking, service redesign and collaborative contracting as a driver for change.

Nicola Sturgeon MSP Cabinet Secretary for Health and Wellbeing

Nicola Sturgeon was born in Irvine, Ayrshire in 1970. She was educated at Greenwood Academy, Irvine and Glasgow University where she studied Law and was awarded LLB (Hons) and Diploma in Legal Practice.

Before entering the Scottish Parliament she worked as a solicitor at the Drumchapel Law and Money Advice Centre in Glasgow.

Nicola was elected to the Scottish Parliament in 1999 and again in 2003, representing the Glasgow Region. She was elected as MSP for the Glasgow Govan constituency in 2007.

Since entering the Scottish Parliament in 1999, she has been the party's spokesperson on Education, Health & Community Care and Justice.

In September 2004, she was elected Deputy Leader of the Scottish National Party.

In May 2007, Nicola was appointed Cabinet Secretary for Health and Wellbeing, with responsibility for the NHS, health service reform, allied healthcare services, acute and primary services, performance, quality and improvement framework, health promotion, sport, public health, health improvement, pharmaceutical services, food safety and dentistry, community care, older people, mental health, learning disability, substance misuse, social inclusion, equalities, anti-poverty measures, housing and regeneration.



Prof Nora Kearney, Professor of Cancer Nursing, University of Stirling

Nora Kearney is Professor of Cancer Care and Director of the Cancer Care Research Centre (CCRC), University of Stirling. Nora was appointed to the University of Stirling in January 2003 following a long clinical career in cancer nursing and previous academic positions at the Universities of Glasgow and Edinburgh. As a cancer nurse she worked in the Beatson Oncology Centre for 11 years and today she continues her clinical practice as a nurse within the chemotherapy unit of Falkirk Royal Infirmary.

Nora has an established reputation as a leader in cancer care in Europe and internationally and was President of the European Oncology Nursing Society between 1997 and 1999 and is actively involved in cancer care developments internationally. Nora leads and collaborates on a number of multi-centre research projects in the areas of patient experience, symptom management in cancer care - including the use of technology - and cancer and the elderly. She has published widely and is regularly invited to international conferences to present keynote and plenary papers. She sits on a number of Scottish Executive committees, including the CSO Cancer Portfolio Group.
